The CFL is the third largest central labor council of the national AFL-CIO, representing half a million working people across Chicago and Cook County. The AFL-CIO is the umbrella federation of U.S. unions, representing 13 million working men and women. Ramirez has served as an officer of the Chicago Federation of Labor since July 2006 and was elected the CFL's first Latino president in July 2010.

Ramirez graduated from the University of Texas at El Paso with a double major in marketing and computer information systems. He later went on to receive his Juris Doctor from the Chicago-Kent College of Law.

Hicks-Delgado shaped opportunities for President Obama and the administration to engage members of Congress. From the West Wing of the White House, she managed bill signing ceremonies, the State of the Union Address, the White House Congressional Picnic, and the White House Congressional Ball.

Before the White House, Hicks-Delgado served Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV), and the Democratic Caucus in the U.S. Senate. Earlier, in the office of Assistant Leader Richard Durbin (D-IL), she directed constituency services and legislative correspondence on education, veterans' affairs', and homeland security & governmental affairs.

She received her bachelor's degree in political science from Southern Illinois University Carbondale, where she served as president of the undergraduate student government and later, as the student representative on the SIU Board of Trustees.
